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Society to Commemorate Centennial with Publication of *Deep Forest*, a "Lost Novel" of Pioneer Days

Before his death in 1950, Society of Indiana Pioneers President Emsley W. Johnson, Sr., completed a novel of Indiana frontier life during the half-century from the Battle of Tippecanoe to the Civil War. This intriguing story patterned on experiences of Hoosier pioneers, chronicles the challenges and triumphs of early settlers.

Before the book is available to the public, Society members will have an opportunity to purchase copies. Members will receive a pre-publication order form later this year and will receive a 10% discount from the \$25.00 retail price. Proceeds from book sales will go to the Society.

Johnson's 65-year-old manuscript was recently discovered among old family papers that had been passed from attic to attic at busy times when family members moved to a new home or died. The Society is underwriting publication, and award-winning historical writer Nancy Niblack Baxter is editing the manuscript for today's readers. The Society of Indiana Pioneers and Hawthorne Publishing will produce 400 copies as a Commemorative Edition to celebrate 100 years of the Society and 200 years of the State of Indiana. Be sure to get your copy and any copies you wish to give to other lovers of histo-

ry or historical novels. Watch for the order form coming in early fall.

President's Message: Jim Fadely 10 "Fun Facts" about the Founding of the Society of Indiana Pioneers

It is with great anticipation that we members of the Society of Indiana Pioneers look toward the year 2016, which marks the centennial of our organization and the bicentennial of Indiana's statehood. As with all anniversaries and moments of commemoration, the events of next year invite our thoughtful reflection. In that spirit, below are ten "fun facts" about the founding of the Society of Indiana Pioneers:

1. In 1915, the Indiana General Assembly established the Indiana Historical Commission, which was given the responsibility for planning and conducting the celebration of the centennial of Indiana's state-

hood. John H. Holliday, publisher of The Indianapolis News, was the chair of the Indianapolis committee.

2. In the midst of all this activity, it occurred to Mrs. John H. Holliday that there should be a society composed of people who were descendants of the early settlers of Indiana, the pioneers who opened the state to civilization.
3. Mrs. Holliday discussed this idea with her good friend Miss Katharine Merrill Graydon, Professor of English at Butler University, who then sent a letter to Mr. Holliday

summarizing the idea and pledging her best efforts to help make it succeed. The Hollidays and Miss Graydon were longtime residents of Indianapolis, fellow Presbyterians, and active in many civic organizations in the city.

4. The Hollidays and Miss Graydon compiled a list of people who might be interested in such an organization and who might qualify for membership. They were invited to a meeting in Mr. Holliday's office at the Union Trust Company to discuss the matter. There was general approval of the idea. A committee was formed to

- develop plans for the new organization. Its members were: Mr. John H. Holliday, Miss Eliza G. Browning, Miss Julia H. Moore, Mrs. Allen B. Philputt, Mr. Charles F. Remy, Dr. Frank B. Wynn, Mr. Amos W. Butler, and Mr. Charles W. Moores.
5. On September 15, 1916, 38 individuals met to hear the report of this committee and its draft of a constitution, which was adopted by the group. This is the "birthday" of the Society of Indiana Pioneers.
 6. Its purpose was "to honor the memory and the work of the pioneers who opened Indiana to civilization." This was to be done by encouraging historical research, forwarding the interpretation and education of state and local history, cooperating with other historical societies, and bringing to the citizens of Indiana information concerning the history of their state and the constructive work done by its pioneers.
 7. The membership of the Society was to consist of people over 21 years of age, one or more of whose ancestors lived in Indiana during the year 1830 or earlier (which would be changed in later years). A member was to pay an entrance fee of one dollar and annual dues of two dollars.
 8. The first election of officers took place at this September 15, 1916 meeting. Mr. John H. Holliday was elected President, a position he held until his death in 1921. Mr. Amos W. Butler became Vice President; Mrs. William Watson Woollen, Secretary; Mr. Charles N. Thompson, Treasurer; and Miss Katharine M. Graydon, Registrar. And the Society elected its first Board of Governors: Mr. Amos W. Butler, Mr. Charles N. Thompson, Miss Katharine M. Graydon, Mrs. William Watson Woollen, and Mr. William H. Insley.
 9. The "public inauguration" of the Society took place at a banquet held in the Riley Room of the Claypool Hotel on December 19, 1916.
 10. The incorporation of the Society did not take place until 1922.
- We would do well to reflect on the mission of the Society of Indiana Pioneers and to express our gratitude for the work of those individuals who founded and launched it in 1916!

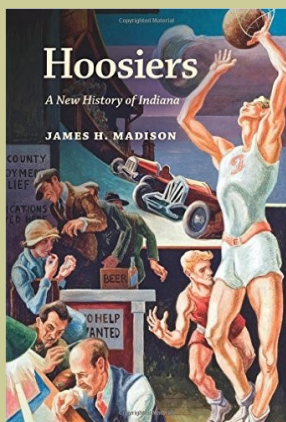
2015 Fall Pilgrimage

State Parks and Bicentennial Heritage
Wednesday & Thursday, September 16-17, 2015 (overnight trip)
Spring Mill State Park Inn, Mitchell, Indiana
McCormick's Creek State Park, Spencer, Indiana

In celebration of the state's upcoming Bicentennial in 2016, the Fall Pilgrimage will feature a salute to Indiana's glorious State Parks, which were launched thanks to the 1916 Centennial; it also sparked the founding of the Society of Indiana Pioneers. Our two-day trip will include a presentation by esteemed historian **James Madison** of the Indiana Bicentennial Commission as well as an 1840s-themed dinner. Special presentations will be featured during our visits to two of our best-known state parks: Spring Mill near Mitchell (where we will spend the night) and McCormick's Creek near Spencer, our first state park.

Day 1 - Wednesday, Sept. 16, 2015 (Lunch, Dinner)

- Enjoy commentary on our drive south from pilgrimage chairman **Nelson Price**.
- Stop at Bloomington Visitors Center & pick up southern Indiana travelers.
- Tour the magnificent Monroe County Courthouse in Bloomington. Built in 1908 with a majestic dome, it is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.
- At the Monroe County History Center, enjoy a tour of the restored, former Carnegie Library built in 1908 (it was the Bloomington Public Library for 52 years) and a special presentation by **Dr. James Madison**, Honorary Member of the Society, titled "Nearly 200 Years of Indiana History". Signed copies of his book, "Hoosiers: A New History of Indiana", published in 2014, will be available for purchase.
- Savor a catered luncheon at the history center.
- Enjoy a motor coach tour of Maple Grove Rural Historic District, the state's first rural historic district. A local expert will be our guide for the district, which is known for 19th Century farmsteads and "dry wood" limestone fences built without mortar.

- Visit the renowned Lilly Library on the Indiana University campus. For our visit, the library will have a special exhibit of Indiana books written prior to 1840 or about the Indiana pioneer era.
- Travel to Spring Mill State Park (Lawrence County), which has a restored and recreated pioneer village that includes a large stone grist mill built in 1817 by two brothers. The town of Spring Mill flourished for a few decades, but gradually waned after the railroads passed it by in the 1850s. By the mid-1890s, the village was abandoned. It was revived beginning with the creation of Spring Mill State Park in the 1920s and the recreation of the “Brigadoon-like” pioneer settlement.
- Savor an 1840s-era dinner in the grist mill (Hamer Mill) with commentary by historic interpreters.
- Spend the evening at the Spring Mill State Park Inn, which was built of Indiana limestone and has hosted national conferences on state parks. All rooms have double queen-size beds and are non-smoking.

Day 2 - Thursday, Sept. 17, 2015 (Breakfast, Lunch, Appetizers)

- Enjoy breakfast at Spring Mill with a speaker about the park, which features an array of log structures, including many moved to the site (and rebuilt) during the 1930s by the Civilian Conservation Corps.
- At Blue Springs Caverns in Lawrence County, enjoy a boat tour of the intriguing cave system discovered in the 1800s. Blue Springs has the third longest cave in the state and is known for its captivating features. For travelers who prefer not to ride the boats, a docent-led walking tour of geological sites will be available.
- Travel to McCormick’s Creek State Park, which was established in 1916 as Indiana’s first state park in an area long cherished by nature lovers and geologists.
- Savor a buffet lunch at the Canyon Inn at McCormick’s Creek.
- Enjoy a presentation about the Civilian Conservation Corps by the park’s naturalist, **Sam Arthur**, in a structure the CCC built. We also will have a walking tour of the area.
- Travel to Bloomington for a guided tour of the Wylie House Museum, the historic home built in 1835 for I.U.’s first president, Andrew Wylie, and his family. The Federal and Georgian-style house is one of the few pre-1840 structures remaining in Bloomington.
- Stop at Oliver Winery for Indy travelers; snack will be given to those departing at Bloomington.

Fun Facts: Indiana State Symbols

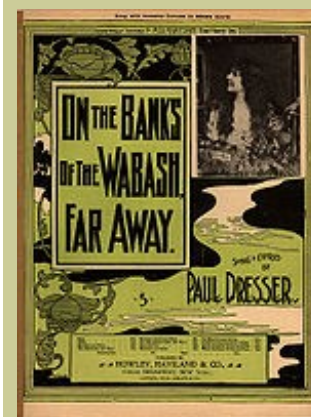
Everyone knows the state bird is the cardinal and the state flower is the peony, but did you know that the state pie is sugar cream pie? Or that the state soil is Miami soil? Miami soil is brown silt loam. It is used to grow corn and soybeans and is highly productive and readily available in Indi-

ana. “Indiana” is the state poem written by Arthur Franklin Mapes, the former Indiana State Poet Laureate. The state song chosen on 14 March 1913 is “On the Banks of the Wabash Far Away” by Paul Dresser. Indiana even has a state rifle—the Grouseland Rifle chosen March 6, 2012. It

was made by gunsmith John Small in the early 1800s. The state river is the Wabash River and is the longest river in the state.

Genealogist's Report—Michele Kerr

Hello! I'm Michele Kerr, the genealogist for The Society of Indiana Pioneers. As I am writing this article, I am taking a break from reviewing a record-breaking 42 applications that have come in over the past 2-3 weeks. It is just amazing the number of applications that we have been receiving – it's keeping me busy and I like it!

If you are a member of The Society of Indiana Pioneers and would like to submit an additional-line ancestor, I have some directions below that will help. Many members have decided to go ahead and add all their possible pioneer ancestors in preparation for the upcoming Centennial celebration in 2016. If you have any other pioneer ancestors that you have been thinking about adding, there is no time like the present to get them done. It is fairly simple.

If it is a spouse of one of your already approved ancestors, then you can simply send in a new top sheet with all the information filled in along with a check for \$15.00 for the additional line application fee. I will take care of the rest.

If it is a child that you have previously documented within an earlier application, then send in a new top sheet as well w/ check for \$15.00 for the additional line fee. If

you need to further document residency dates, then simply add any necessary documentation with the application and once again, I can take care of the rest. If you add a new line, then you will need to submit a new application with all the information filled in on pages 1-4. We will need documentation on any generation that has not been previously documented; please make sure that all generations tie in together

Just as a reminder, we do have a Facebook group that you can request to join. It is a closed group, so you simply need to ask to join and you will have access to our group. Insights into the approval process, as well as helpful tips for researching in Indiana are added regularly. Members have joined in the conversation and even share events happening around Indiana of interest to our group. As we continue into the Centennial Year of 2016, I will add information on upcoming activities!

If you are a twitter user, I post myself

(@MicheleKerr), and for the group (@IndianaPioneers.) Twitter is an excellent way to stay on top of all things "genealogy!" I have a wide variety of Indiana organizations that I follow as well as many well known genealogy-minded people. Board Member in the News — Roberta Graham

Board of Governors member Roberta Graham and her husband Jim were featured in two recent articles in The Indianapolis Star. In 2005, Indiana National Guard soldiers serving in Afghanistan discovered a seriously ill infant, Qudrat Wardak and made arrangements through Rotary Clubs in Central

Indiana and Riley Hospital for Children for him to come to Indianapolis for life-saving heart surgery. After the surgery, Qudrat and his father Hakim were taken in by the Grahams and they became the boy's "American grandparents." Sadly, upon Qudrat's return to Afghani-

stan he died. However, his father was inspired by his time in America and then went on to college. The Grahams raised \$300,000 to help Hakim build two schools and a medical clinic, which serve women, as well as men and helped bring hope to his native village.

Prominent Hoosiers Who Served as Leaders of The Society of Indiana Pioneers (Part 1)

As we approach the centennial of The Society of Indiana Pioneers and the bicentennial of Indiana's statehood in 2016, it is both interesting and instructive to re-visit our heritage and history. Over almost a century, many prominent Hoosiers have honored the memory and the work of their pioneer ancestors by taking leadership roles in The Society of Indiana Pioneers.

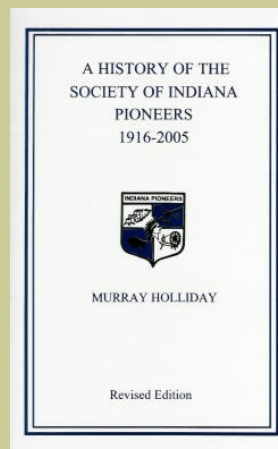
Any history of the Society begins with its founder and first president, **John Hampden Holliday (May 31, 1846 – October 20, 1921)**. Holliday's granddaughter, Evaline Hitz Rhodehamel, is a current member of Pioneers. She wrote a biographical sketch of her grandpar-

ents for the updated edition of *A History of the Society of Indiana Pioneers, 1916 – 2005*. Here is a portion of the sketch from that history that highlights the lesser-known role of her grandmother:

"It is not a coincidence that the celebration of the Indiana Centennial in 1916 was the year of the founding of the Society of Indiana Pioneers. Many of the first members were active in the several committees planning for the events and activities to take place in the capital city and across the state that year. John H. Holliday chaired one of these groups. Although he served as the first president of the Society until his death in 1921, it was his wife, Evaline MacFarlane Rieman Hol-

liday, a native of Baltimore, who first proposed an association of the descendants of Indiana Pioneers. The purpose of the Society was, and remains, to honor the memory and achievements of those early settlers. She may have been inspired by the existence of some other lineage societies begun a few years earlier. She was already a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the National Society of the Colonial Dames of America. She was ineligible for Pioneer membership but was appointed as the Society's first Honorary Member and enjoyed her association with the group until her death in 1929."

This is the first of 20 prominent Hoosiers who will appear over the next several newsletters.



Pioneer Founders of Indiana—Carolyn Rose & Stanley Evans

We are thrilled to report that the fifth and final Pioneer Founders of Indiana booklet is in the final stages of completion. The deadline for nominations of July 15th has passed with a total of over 165 new submissions for the 2014/2015 booklet. The next phase will be to edit the material, layout the final composition and print copies for the 2015 Society of Indiana Pioneers Annual Meeting in November.

The program was started back in 2010 for the purpose of offering an opportunity for

members and non-members, Hoosiers and non-Hoosiers to write about their Indiana pioneer ancestors in Indiana's 92 counties. Each year the response has grown and the program now has surpassed the 500 submissions mark. All of those contributors to the program are to be thanked and we hope that the future generations will at some time check out their ancestor's stories that are now in print and on file with the society, DAR, libraries and perhaps on the family geneal-

ogy shelf. In today's electronic age history can be erased and forgotten at the click of a thumb! Again we thank all who have participated in the program.

So now we have five booklets. What is next? The Board of Governors has voted to combine all five booklets and make such valuable information available sometime during the centennial year of 2016. A committee has been formed to study the various types of publication and will make its recommendations to the Board. Members will be kept advised as the process unfolds.

John Hampden Holliday Prize
