President's Message: Jim Fadely

(From the President's Message in the 2016 Yearbook)

Welcome to the centennial year of The Society of Indiana Pioneers and to the bicentennial year of the state of Indiana! We have an exciting and historic year ahead of us. The Society will mark this milestone year in the following ways:

- The John Hampden Holiday Prize will be awarded to the best contributions to Indiana history published in 2013, 2014, 2015, or 2016. The first-place prize is \$5,000, second-place \$3,000, and third-place \$2,000. This award honors our founding president and has been endorsed by the Indiana Bicentennial Commission as a Bicentennial Legacy Project.
- The publication of *Deep Forest*. This long-lost manuscript was written by Emsley Johnson, Sr., who was president of Pioneers in 1940-46. It is a deeply researched and beautifully written historical novel about pioneer Indiana. *Deep Forest* is an endorsed Bicentennial Legacy Project.
- The publication of *Pioneer Founders of Indiana*. For five years, beginning in 2010, the Society solicited submissions of biographical sketches of pioneers from all 92 counties. This democratic outreach effort by the Society resulted in a book with fascinating personal stories of the

Indiana frontier. *Pioneer Founders of Indiana* is a Bicentennial Legacy Project.

- Our Hoosier Heritage Spring Pilgrimage will visit our first state capitol in Corydon, where we will plant an American elm on the capitol grounds to mark our centennial year and the state's bicentennial. We chose an elm as a nod to the famous Constitutional Elm under which our 1816 Constitution was written. We will go on to Cedar Farm, a restored 1837 Greek Revival house on the banks of the Ohio near Laconia, owned by the Cook family, and then to Madison for a tour of their 133-block National Historic Landmark District.
- Our Hoosier Heritage Fall Pilgrimage will go to the Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial, New Harmony, where we will tour this National Historic Landmark District and stay overnight at the renowned New Harmony Inn, and Vincennes, where we will enjoy cocktails and hors d'oeuvres in William Henry Harrison's Grouseland, a National Historic Landmark in Indiana's oldest city.
- Finally, our centennial gala will be held on Monday, June 27, at Conner Prairie Interactive History Park near Indianapolis.

I encourage all members to actively engage their Society this year and to participate in as many activities as possible! Write A Review of *Deep Forest* for Your Local Paper

As part of our state's Bicentennial celebration, the Society is sponsoring publication of the only official fiction project of the Bicentennial: the publication of former Society president Emsley W. Johnson, Sr.'s "lost 1950 novel." *Deep Forest: A Novel of the Indiana Frontier* was found in granddaughter (and board member) Martha Sue Batt's attic. It was updated for publication and has found real welcome in the history community in the state.

The reception to this one-of-a-kind historical publication, which combines Johnson's own lifelong research of the frontier in Indiana with his family heritage, has been enthusiastic. Since the November annual meeting release, the book has been bought by over 200 readers and sold on Amazon and at

the Conner Prairie gift shop. It has enhanced the reputation of the Society, brought knowledge of the group to people all over the state, and been praised as a novel for its literary appeal and specific information of early Hoosiers.

Now Society members have an opportunity to take the book one step further and also to enhance their own historical writing credentials by reviewing the book for local sources. Do you have a city paper, county magazine, historical-interest publication or blog? Radio station for a personal interview about the book? Would you read and review the book in a 300-400-word review to further

knowledge of this Society project for the 200th year? If you are interested in reviewing *Deep Forest*, please contact the Society office for a set of brief instructions and a fact sheet about the book and its discovery. It is important to have reviews in outlets all over the state. Many newspapers have already printed information on this bicentennial project; a follow-up review could be welcomed.

Finally, our centennial year has begun and if this first month and a half is any indication, we should have record numbers in new ancestors as well as new members! As 2015 closed out, I participated once again in the Statehood Day Celebration at the Indiana State House with the help of Board Members, Julie Newhouse and Charles Bragg who also enlisted the help of his lovely wife, Karen Bragg. Interacting with 4th graders for even 5-6 minutes at a time, becomes very reassuring when I get positive responses to questions such as, “What is an ancestor?” and “Can anyone tell me what a family tree is?” I am looking forward to this year’s Statehood Day as we will be closing out quite an exciting year in Indiana history!

While we are getting a large number of first-time members, it has also become pretty common to see members joining their children and other family members to recognize this Bicentennial/Centennial year. This can be a fairly easy and painless process as I can help by only requiring that you submit the first page of the application. Here’s an example: If you have a son or daughter that you would like to add as a member, you would only need

to fill out the top page, enclose their birth certificate that confirms their generational information, and submit the application fee and first year’s dues (\$50.) Of course, if they are married, then we will need to have the spouse’s documentation and marriage record, but with those items in hand, I can easily fill out the rest of the application for you. (I do ask that you submit a note explaining their relationship to you as the member!)

If you would like to add your parent as a new member, then it gets even easier! I just need a top page filled out along with the application fee and first year’s dues (\$50.) Because their documentation is already on file, then we do not require that you submit their information again! (Please refer to your application.) It is the same thing for siblings since you have submitted their parents’ documentation along with your own initial application.

The interesting part of being a member that you might not be considering is that one hundred years from now, it will be our names that our descendants will find listed as members in this

group and how exciting for them to know that we felt so strongly about our own Indiana heritage that we took the time to locate documentation and submit it for approval. I think that way of the earlier founders of our group and I am sure that our descendants will be extremely happy to find the records that we have uncovered!

As we continue to migrate into the social media age, I have found that we have quite a community of FaceBook members that love to engage in Indiana history. If you would like to contribute or simply just read what others are saying, our group is a great place to learn and to share. Prominent Hoosiers Who Served as Leaders of The Society of Indiana Pioneers (Part 2)

Below are other prominent Hoosiers who have served on the Board of Governors (with years of service):

- Mary Quick Burnet (1936-38) – Author of the seminal Art and Artists of Indiana.

- Donald F. Carmony (1984-89) – Professor of history at Indiana University, editor of the Indiana Magazine of History, author of Indiana, 1816-1850: The Pioneer Era, and was made an Honorary Member of The Society of Indiana Pioneers in 2001. He was known to many as “Mr. Indiana History.”

- Ralph D. Gray (2008-11) – Author and Indiana historian. His books include Alloys and Automobiles: The Life of Elwood Haynes, Meredith Nicholson: A

Writing Life, Gentlemen from Indiana: National Party Candidates, 1836-1940, Public Ports for Indiana: A History of the Indiana Port Commission, The Hoosier State: Readings in Indiana History, and IUPUI: The Making of an Urban University.

- Byron P. Hollett (1962-64) – Indianapolis attorney and personal attorney for Eli Lilly. His ancestor Jeremiah Sullivan of Madison provided the name for the city of Indianapolis.

- Alexander R. Holliday (1925-26) – Son of John H. and Evaline R. Holliday. He also served as vice president (1925-26).

- Floyd D. Hopper (1969-74) – Hoosier artist regarded as the

“dean of Indiana watercolorists,” who studied at the Herron School of Art and Design and the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts.

- Eli Lilly (1936-46) – Grandson of Col. Eli Lilly, founder of Eli Lilly and Company, and son of Josiah K. Lilly, Sr. He was president of the company and then chairman of the board of directors.

- Josiah K. Lilly, Sr. (1927-29) – Only child of Col. Eli Lilly, founder of Eli Lilly and Company, and later president of the company.

President Fadely recognized retiring Board member Jinsie Bingham for her six years of service and Board member Dan McCain for his three years of service.

The President noted that membership in the Society stands at 984 with a goal of surpassing 1,000 members during the centennial year 2016. He delivered a summary report of the many activities of the Board in 2015 and activities leading up to Society's centennial and Indiana's bicentennial in 2016:

Deep Forest. Copies of the historical novel by former Society President, the late Emsley Johnson, Sr., are selling briskly. The only piece of fiction endorsed by the Indiana Bicentennial Commission to date, it makes a wonderful gift for persons interested in early Indiana history.

Centennial/Bicentennial Gala.

To mark the Society's centennial and the bicentennial of Indiana statehood, a gala event is planned for Monday, June 27, at Conner Prairie History Park. A highlight will be to honor descendants of the signers of Indiana's 1816 Constitution. The committee is working with Friends of the Indiana Archives in planning the event.

Education Initiatives. No applications for the Society's grants for graduate students studying Indiana history were received. The amount set aside will be rolled over for future years.

Jr History Award. Representatives of the Brownsburg High School History Club were guests of the Society for lunch to receive the check as winners of the 2015 Society of Indiana Pioneers John H. Holliday Award.

John Hampden Holliday Prize.

The prize will be awarded to up to three individuals who make the most significant contribution to the field of Indiana pioneer history in works published in the years 2013, 2014, 2015 or 2016. The top prize will be the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), with second and third prizes being awarded in lesser amounts. Board member Julie Newhouse is chairing this effort, a project that has also received endorsement from the Indiana Bicentennial Commission.

Marketing/Publicity.

Board member Martha Sue Batt has been quite busy with a new brochure, press releases, radio public service an-

nouncements and ads in publications of the DAR and SAR to promote the Society.

Pioneer Founders. The 2014 publication of contributions to the Pioneer Founders collection was distributed at the Annual Meeting. The Board has approved publication in 2016 of the compilation of all submissions, another project endorsed by the Indiana Bicentennial Commission.

Pilgrimages. The 2016 pilgrimages will focus on marking the centennial of the Society and bicentennial of Indiana statehood.

Awards Chair William Rhodehamel introduced Matt Walsh, chair of the Social Studies Department at Brownsburg High School, and Thomas Reinhart, President of the BHS History Club. The Brownsburg club was selected as the 2015 recipient of the Society of Indiana Pioneers John H. Holliday Award, presented annually to a class or club that submits a nomination describing participation in a project, program or activity related to early Indiana history in the current school year. A check for \$300 was presented to Mr. Walsh and Thomas. Congratulations to the BHS History Club and its sponsor Dawn Crone.

Elizabeth Cruft Holliday, mother of Board member Evie Rhodehamel, led the first roll call at a meeting of Society members in the Riley Room of Indianapolis' Claypool Hotel in December, 1916. This year, William Rhodehamel, grandson of Elizabeth Holliday (Hitz) and great-grandson of John H. Holliday, led the Roll Call!

Forty-five young singers from Young Voices of Indianapolis conducted by Marian Pardue-Bender performed a very well-conceived "Hoosier Bicentennial Medley". The presentation included a number of musical selections and a recitation of a James Whitcomb Riley poem interspersed with some notes of historical interest which were well-researched and delivered by the young performers. The audience expressed its appreciation with a standing ovation at the program's conclusion.
