New Society DVD Debuts on Website and in Libraries

Go to indianapioneers.com, to see the new video about the Society of Indiana Pioneers, its projects, and its benefits for members. You can also view five shorter video segments online by clicking on the VIDEOS tab on the home page. These are on Membership and Genealogy, Pilgrimages, The Holliday Prize, The Founders Project, and Education and Fellowships.

Copies of the full DVD have been donated to the Indiana

State Library, Indiana Historical Society, Allen County Public Library Genealogy Section, The Family History Library in Salt Lake City, and the Library of Congress. The videos are also on YouTube and Vimeo where you can download them free of charge. Some Society members put links on their personal Facebook page, so their contacts can view the video. The Society's new QR code is being added to all Society brochures, so that the code

can take you directly to the website to see the video.

The DVD is available free for prospective members, genealogy societies and conferences, school history clubs, and others. Thanks go to Mark Smith, who is distributing the DVD to Carroll County schools, libraries, and other interested groups.



President's Message: Michael Miller

For a moment in time, I will digress. Each of us has been witness to amazing and sometimes challenging leaps in technological advancement. My perspective, as a university student: Lotus 1,2,3® and the earliest Apple® had just made their entry to the marketplace. As an accounting & operations "geek" my world was about to change forever. My newly found "mechanical" pencil was about to be shown the sideline. A glimpse into the life of a university student in the late 1970's and early 1980's if you desired to be organized. Computers were still not widely available; let alone inexpensive.

Leap forward with me to today, many of us are presented with tools beyond imagination of a "pioneer;" a time we love to understand and seek to find connection with. Some call it a 'genealogy bug," I perceive it as our birth-right. How did each of us get here

today? Our ancestors lived life and did what was required just to get through the day. Survival was sometimes the best focus. Life, for most, was not about writing things down or keeping track of every piece of paper. Even beyond our pioneer ancestors, many families in the 1990's, chose to burn or otherwise destroy records of lives lived in our past. We can't fault them as they made decisions based on what was right for them at the time; carry the paper or protect their loved ones. Bulletin: please spread the word - put those historical records in the care of the Indiana Historical Society or the Indiana State Library; later generations will thank you. Each is a wonderful home to preserve your histories and the families who lived out our early Indiana history.

You and I live in a period of incredible advancement in technology. We must use it to our advantage in the under-

standing of our pioneer, Indiana ancestors. Ancestry.com® is just one of a variety of great "roadmaps" I use when I am lost. All of the internet sources are wonderful tools. My caveat: you still must do your own work to ensure "you" are comfortable with any lineage you are seeking to outline. The "buck" stops with you. It's your family. Make sure you are personally satisfied with your work, with supporting back-up. Looking back, unfortunately, many of our personal family records were lost or never kept. The "computer age" assists us with means to re-discovering a "roadmap" charted long ago. For many, to places they may never physically go... However, maps change and wrong information is sometimes included in a map. Question everything you see. If you're comfortable with the trail, please present your findings and back-up (supporting proof) to a real, live genealogist to confirm your understanding. We look forward to working with you on charting your past.

Marketing and Advertising

The Society recently placed ads in over 90 newspapers across Indiana in an attempt to introduce Indiana residents to our historical organization and invite them to join. Our objective is to offer all Hoosier descendants of our Indiana pioneers the opportunity to honor, with us, their pioneer ancestors. In the last three years we placed newspaper ads in only those counties which

were being highlighted in the Pioneer Founders of Indiana program. This year, we focused on the entire state using the ICAN program of newspaper advertising. A new feature in the ad is the addition of a QR (quick response tag for smart phones) which will send the reader directly to our website and the newly

developed Society video. We should have the results of our ad effort to report in the next newsletter.

Spring Pilgrimage 2013 Thursday, May 16, 2013 Columbus Architecture Homes & Gardens of the Miller Family & Other Historic Sites Columbus, Indiana

Have you been among those eagerly waiting to visit the mid-modern J. Irwin Miller House and Garden in Columbus, now owned by the Indianapolis Museum of Art? This is a chance for a private tour of the recently renovated, Mid-Century Modern house commissioned in 1953 by the late philanthropist J. Irwin Miller, who built Cummins Engine into a Fortune 500 company.

Designed by renowned Finnish architect Eero Saarinen, the 6,700-square-foot Miller House is a National Historic Landmark & considered one of the best examples in the country of the modernist movement. Also on the

tour is the home's thirteen-acre garden created to harmonize with the house & designed by landscape architect David Urban Kiley.

Of course, no trip to Columbus would be complete without a tour of architectural sites, including churches of various denominations, that have made the city famous.

Friday, September 6, 2013 Limberlost, Amish and Berne Geneva and Berne, Indiana

Following the popular Spring Pilgrimage last year to the Rome City/Wildflower Woods (second) cabin of acclaimed naturalist Gene Stratton-Porter, this tour will visit her cherished home, the original Limberlost cabin in Geneva.

During her 25 years in Geneva,

she burst to fame and wrote thirteen books about the Hoosier region that inspired her, including the international best-seller "A Girl of the Limberlost" (1909).

Other highlights of the trip to northeastern Indiana will include visits to an Amish school & home; a local expert will share insights about the faith community & their distinctive way of life.

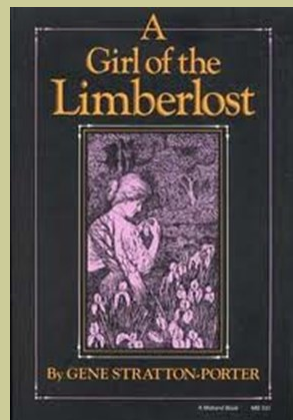

John Hampden Holliday Prize

In anticipated celebration of the Society's centennial and the upcoming bicentennial of the State of Indiana in December of 2016, the Society of Indiana Pioneers has launched an award for the promotion of the highest quality of scholarship, research and writing about Indiana Pioneer History from pre-history to and including the year 1851.

The John Hampden Holliday

Prize will be awarded to up to three individuals who make the most significant contribution to the field of Indiana pioneer history in works published in the years 2013, 2014, 2015 or 2016. The top prize will be the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), with second and third prizes being awarded in lesser amounts.

The prize will be awarded at a Centennial-Bicentennial Banquet in December of 2016, along with appropriate trophies. Nominations must be submitted on or before February 1, 2016.

2016 Indiana Bicentennial & The Society of Indiana Pioneers Centennial

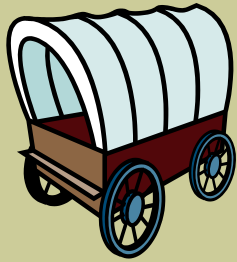
